However recently we have been stuck on Billy Joel’s hit *The River of Dreams*.

If you’ve never listened to the song before, the song has a rather upbeat rhythm. Great for spontaneous childlike movement. However, if you listen to the lyrics, the story of the song is rather sad. It is one person’s unending search for hope in life. Every night they come down to the river of dreams, knowing that something exists on the other side. Unfortunately, they have not been able to cross to the other side to discover what that hope is.

As we dance to the song I realize that my kids have not yet had their hearts broken, they have not yet had to ask the question. “Why?” I can only hope and pray as their parent, when that time comes for them, as they do for all of us, that Jennifer and I can slow the music down and dance slowly with them. Wading in the water with them as we get to that hope on the other side of the river where dreams still do exist.

One question I think the church faces is, “Why go to church?” Surely, as the Psalmist rightly suggests, God is everywhere, and we cannot escape God (Psalm 139). God is not a being, randomly met at church houses on a Sunday morning. God is the creator, and thus God is in all creation.

To make matters worse, that question is often asked because the church has been hurtful. The church has left many standing on the opposite side of the river looking for hope somewhere else.


The Apostle Paul said our Christian life is like running a race (1 Cor. 9). Of course, in many ways this is true. However, when asked, “Why go to church?”

Perhaps the answer is, as Richard Rohr suggests because God wants to dance with us. Because we are a part of God’s creation, God wants to lead us into his harmonized love. God wants a perfect communion with us. Ultimately, to dance with God is to be present before the Presence. To rest in an unlimited source of love. We learn the choreography of this dance from Jesus Christ. Further, we learn how to dance with one another when we allow ourselves to come and hear of Christ’s life. So hopefully when we come to church, it forms us into discipleship that yearns to “go into the world” searching for our neighbor’s hand. Completing the dance circle. Finding communion.

That way we can remind anyone we meet, whether they are standing on the other side of the river or not, that we are all children of God and God wants to dance with all of us. And whether we know it or not, in Christ, we are already dancing on God’s promised side of the river.

So come and let’s dance with one another in God’s eternal love.

16th-century guidance for today

How can we know whether we're following God's will? Sometimes we act, only to see in hindsight that we caused harm. Or self-righteousness blinds us to the good guidance of others.

St. Ignatius of Loyola pondered the difficulty of aligning our actions to God's ways. He taught the need for "discernment of spirits" — examining internal thoughts and emotions to see if they originate with and lead to God. Ignatius called it "consolation" when he felt loved by God and eager to care for people in need, and "desolation" when something left him full of darkness and fear that moved him away from God and neighbor.

Think of a time you made a decision and then felt peaceful, full of light, convinced it was "right." And when have you done something despite feeling tangled in knots about it, and perhaps later felt worse? Life isn't always so clear-cut, but the more we practice discernment, the better we will recognize and follow God's will.

Make it count!

This is our time on the history line of God. This is it. What will we do with the one deep exhale of God on this earth? For we are but a vapor and we have to make it count. We're on. Direct us, Lord, and get us on our feet.

Finding our range

While visiting a church, Robert Neff learned a lesson about the body of Christ. As he listened to a tenor's faltering voice, he noticed worshipers pulling out hymnals to locate the soloist's song.

"By the second verse, the congregation had joined the soloist in the hymn," Neff says. "By the third verse, the tenor was beginning to find the range. By the fourth verse, it was beautiful. And on the fifth verse, the congregation was absolutely silent, and the tenor sang the most beautiful solo of his life."

Neff concludes: "This is life in the body of Christ, enabling one another to sing the tune Christ has given us."


